

FE 601: Essential Functions of the Pastor (1 credit)

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Overview/Course Description:

This is an integrative practicum that focuses on the essential functions of the pastoral and chaplaincy offices including: worship leadership, celebrating the sacraments, conducting funerals, making visits and observing proper etiquette. Each day we will reflect on, discuss, and practice various pastoral functions.

Course Objectives:

By the completion of the course the student will have obtained knowledge and practice in:

1. The preparation and leading of worship services, including public prayer and the celebration of sacraments.
2. The conduct of wedding rehearsals and services, funerals, memorials, and graveside services.
3. The art of pastoral calling in homes, hospitals, and other institutional settings.
4. The care of people and families at the end of life and in the journey of grief.
5. Theological reflection on all of the above.

1. Nurture habits and disciplines of study, prayer and reflection that increase students' love of God and neighbor and shape their personal and professional lives.
2. Be formed by, live in, and minister out of Scripture and the historical and theological tradition of the church.

4. Engage contemporary theological and ethical issues with insight and humility.
5. Provide pastoral care for individuals and congregations in daily life and moments of transition and crisis.
